

As noted elsewhere in this edition, our office has changed to an updated version of our utility system, which resulted in a change of format for your utility invoices. The transition to this new utility program came with a great deal of navigating through an abundance of technical modifications. Our Administrative Assistant, Ann Beck, has diligently stayed on top of the modifications. She is still working with Civica CMI, who provides our computer system services, to make sure all of the necessary utility applications and information have been transferred from our former utility system accurately and are consistent with the required data.

Our Administrative Specialist, Heather Alicea, has also been busy with taking the required training to earn her CMC (Certified Municipal Clerk) status. She has successfully completed three years of training at the Ohio Municipal Clerks Association, as well as three years at the Ohio Association of Public Treasurers. Not unlike other positions in our work force, a municipal clerk/treasurer is certified through the State of Ohio. Several years ago, the State of Ohio created a Fiscal Integrity Act, and certain approved annual training is mandatory for that position. Once Heather completes one more year of training, she will be eligible to attain her CMC status.



This will be tentatively scheduled for the weeks of October 9th & 16th. Water dept. employees will begin flushing and valve exercising at approximately 8:30 am and stop around 3:00 pm daily.

You may experience low flow and or cloudy/discolored water during this period. Please let your tap run and the condition should clear up relatively quickly.

As fall approaches, the Street Department will shift from yard waste to leaf pick up. Yard waste will end on October 24th. We ask that as leaf pick up begins, you only put out leaves, as sticks and debris will damage our equipment. Please rake your leaves to the curbside.

We will continue with pavement repairs and curb repairs throughout the fall, as well as work with the Water Department to jet and clean catch basins and drain tiles. The South Main Street, Brooklyn Heights project has wrapped up and went as planned. Thank you to all the residents who were patient during this project.

We are continually upgrading our electric system such as switching the old street lighting to new LED lighting and new electronic controls throughout the system. We will also be doing various equipment upgrades on our electrical system to make it more efficient and stable.

Part of making our system more stable is by doing tree trimming around our primary lines, which we continually work on. We are still installing animal guards/protectors throughout the system to minimize animal contacts/outages.

Colton Ott, the department's apprentice recently completed the Basic 1 level of the AMP Apprentice Line Worker Training Program, with classroom and hands-on experiences. Colton is enrolled in the 4-year apprenticeship program, and will continue to work toward attaining his line worker certification with future classes in the training program, as well as on-the-job training.

As always, please report any outages/problems to the Electric Dept. as soon as possible (after hours please call Police Dept so they can contact the on-call employee) and NEVER touch any electric lines that are on the ground or within reach.

The EPA is mandating public water systems to complete a lead service line inventory by October of 2024.

To meet this mandate the Village needs to verify the service line material on both the Village and privately owned side (normally from meter or curb stop to the connection in the basement).

In order to accomplish this, we will need to gain access to most basements. You can call the Water Dept. at 419-465-4182 to set up a day and time to have this done. The goal is to eliminate all lead from the drinking water service lines.

Just to remind everyone, fixed speed and red-light cameras are in place at Monroe and Main Street intersection; U.S. 20 and State Route 99 intersection; and U.S. 20 westbound at Brooklyn Heights. In addition, new cameras are set up on State Rt. 547 near the intersection of Lebeau and North Street near Marsh Field. This is in addition to the mobile laser devices used by your officers. So please, obey the traffic laws!!



School has started so be sure to observe when the flashing lights are in operation that signify a reduction in the speed limit to 20mph.

#### **Photo Enforcement most FAQS**

1. Are there any points for camera tickets and will the violations appear on my driving record?

There are no points associated with these tickets and the violations will not appear on your driving record.

2. Do I need to show proof of insurance for my camera ticket?

You do not need to provide proof of insurance for these tickets.

3. What happens if the ticket is not paid by the due date?

If the ticket is not paid by the due date listed on your ticket a \$25.00 late fee will be added to the balance. After 60 days of not being paid, an \$80.00 late fee will be added.

4. What if someone else was driving my vehicle at the time of the violation?

You must complete the option at the bottom of the back page (Affidavit of Defense) of your citation designating another person as the driver. You have 30 days from receipt of the citation to complete, notarize, and return the affidavit to the Monroeville Police Dept.

5. How do I contest the citation?

You have 30 days from receipt of the citation to contest and request a hearing. To contest the citation, you must complete option "1" on the back of the citation. Mail the citation to the Monroeville Police Department P.O. Box 85, Monroeville, Ohio 44847. You will be notified by mail of your hearing date. You may also drop off the hearing request at the Monroeville Police Department or Village Offices.

**6.** Can camera tickets be paid online like traffic and parking tickets?

Yes, these citations can also be paid online at www.viewcitation.com. You will be asked to provide your citation number along with a pin number. That information is listed on your citation.

7. Can I view the violation?

Yes. There are three still photos along with a streaming video. Go to <u>www.viewcitation.com</u> and list your citation number and pin number of the violation to view the photos and video.

**8.** Does an officer need to be present at the camera location.

No. Even though that section of the law is still posted on the State of Ohio's web site, it was ruled unconstitutional by the Ohio Supreme Court (Dayton v. State of Ohio 2017).

#### RELIABILITY & SUSTAINABILITY

OMNI Fiber will soon be rolling out high speed internet across the Village and in the adjacent areas of the township.

The build out has taken longer than was originally anticipated, but we believe it will be worth the wait to now have a dedicated, symmetrical, fiber optic network which will also support phone service and television packages.

Look for a mailer and upcoming advertising from OMNI in the next couple of weeks.

The Hilltop and South Main Street water line projects have been completed. This was the culmination of many years of similar projects to improve the reliability of the water system.

As a companion to the South Main Street project, Brooklyn Heights and a portion of South Main Street were resurfaced. Council plans to continue street resurfacing in 2024.

Soil test borings have recently been completed on the former Commercial House property in the downtown area. This is another step Council has taken in hopes of converting the vacant lot into downtown, off-street, parking.

First Energy has been rebuilding the transmission network between Halfway Road and Bellevue. The first segment from Halfway Rd to Monroe Street has been completed. This reconstruction will have a positive impact on the reliability of service to the Village.

The Street Division continues to utilize a single-unit packer for yard waste and debris pick up. This piece of equipment was procured with funding from a Safety Intervention Grant through the Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation. Please make certain to not place oversized tree limbs and branches at the curb.

Over the next few weeks, you should see two new commercial operations at the Fort Monroe Industrial Park. Optimistically, this will be the start of a new, mixed use, type of business in the Village.

The Ohio Department of Transportation is planning a 2024 resurfacing project for the entire length of SR 99, including North and South Ridge Streets in the Village. A mid-2024 start date if forecasted.


Christmas in the Park in Hallmarkesque Commons Park, Monroeville, Sunday, December 10<sup>th</sup> 4PM - 6PM.
